Curriculum focus of PPG spending in 2019/2020

To provide:

- Support for PPG children in areas of mathematics, including rapid recall and fluency, to enhance their learning
- Phonics programmes developed and delivered to children in all key stages
- English support through IDL intervention programme
- Continue the support already provided through intervention in mathematics, literacy and the foundation subjects
- Emotional literacy support for children who require one to one opportunity to have a trusted adult/key worker supporting them
- Enhancing the provision of PE and sport for those children who excel
